

MEETING THE CNA MANDATORY STATE EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSURE

		Hours of Education
<p>The State of Florida requires CNAs to have a minimum of 12 hours of education per year</p>	<p>CNAs can meet some of these requirements by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Completing their Health First annual mandatory e-learning education (see below) • Completing the “HIV/AIDS” self learning module • Completing CNA self-learning modules that are available through Health First Center for Learning on various (85+) topics • Attending live educational presentations for CNAs • CPR provider card (must be kept current through out licensure period) 	<p>4.5 per year</p> <p>1.0 per licensure period</p> <p>1.0 for each module</p> <p>Varies</p> <p>3 – 5 hours, depending upon which course you attend</p>

At Health First the following **mandatory state topic requirements** can be met by completing the following:

State Required Education	Health First Annual Mandatory E-Learning Education
1. Infection Control	Infection Control, Pandemic Flu and TB
2. Domestic Violence	Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation
3. Documentation & Legal Aspects for CNAs	HIPAA Privacy and Corporate Compliance
4. Resident Rights	HIPAA Privacy, Ethics, End of Life
5. Medical Error Prevention and Safety	Hazard Communication, Interim Life Safety Measures (ILSM), Safe Driving, and Appropriate Workplace Behavior

- CNAs must retain education compliance records (certificates) for a period of 4 years and submit records to the state of Florida if required for auditing.
- Instruction on computer training, staff meetings, etc. **DO NOT** count toward the total of 12 hours of education required by the state of Florida every year.
